Funding approved for Village Hall extension and refurbishment in Walton, Wetherby

The residents of Walton and surrounding areas are set to get an extended and improved Village Hall, thanks to a £97,000 grant from FCC Communities Foundation, £28,800 from the Platinum Jubilee Village Halls Fund, £9,900 from the National Lottery Community Fund and further grants from other sources.

The money will be used to build an extension to house new toilet facilities, including those for the disabled, replace the hall floor, improve insulation and install a new infra-red heating system.

Brian Eldred, chair of trustees of Walton Village Hall, Wetherby, believes the facility will make a huge difference to the lives of people living in the area.

He says: "This project will provide a real boost to the people of Walton. The village hall is a wonderful building with great charm and character, but it was built in 1847, has outdated facilities, a rotting floor, poor insulation and heating and a lack of storage space. It's fantastic that FCC Communities Foundation, ACRE, the National Lottery and the other funders have awarded us this money. We plan to start the work in the new year, and we're really looking forward to our improvement projects taking shape over the next few months."

Walton Village Hall, Wetherby is a registered charity, number 1196471, registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation.

We are a village hall in a small community of around 200 residents, and also serve neighbouring villages. The hall was built in 1847 and was a village school until 1927 when it was left in trust by a local landowner for use a village hall. Adjoining the hall is a playground owned by the Parish Council, but which can also be used for some hall events.

Since the current committee was formed in 2019 we have expanded our activities to serve a wide range of users. These include an art group, a school holiday club, Wetherby in Support of the Elderly, children's dance classes, village, church and Parish Council events as well as children's parties and wedding receptions.

To encourage the re-use, recycle and recovery of more value from waste and use more environmentally friendly methods of waste disposal, Landfill Tax is charged on each tonne of waste sent to landfill. Landfill Operators (LOs) are able to redirect a small proportion of landfill tax liability to support a wide range of community and environmental projects in the vicinity of landfill sites through the Landfill Communities Fund (LCF) and Scottish Landfill Communities Fund (SLCF). The LCF is regulated

by ENTRUST on behalf of HM Revenue & Customs, and the projects are delivered by enrolled Environmental bodies (EBs). The SLCF is regulated by SEPA on behalf of Revenue Scotland and projects are delivered by Approved Bodies (ABs).
